Penguins are Facing Extinction — Livestock and Overfishing are to Blame



Penguins and other species are facing extinction as fishing fleets harvest their prey for livestock feed.

According to the International Union for Conservation of Nature, the African penguin, Spheniscus demersus, Galapagos penguin, Spheniscus mendiculus, yellow-eyed penguin and Megadyptes antipodes are now classified as endangered. Glyn Davies, executive director of global programmes at the

Glyn Davies, executive director of global programmes at the World Wildlife Fund (WWF), said: "The decline of species is reaching a critical point and we cannot ignore the role of unsustainable livestock production."

In addition to unsustainable extraction of fish for livestock feed, our demand for seafood is also driving marine ecosystems into an alarming downward spiral.

Experts predict many (if not all) of our fisheries will collapse in just a few short decades. The truth is, with a population of 7.5 billion people and growing, any notion of so-called "sustainable fishing" is a fantasy.

The good news is that we can *easily* stop this assault on our oceans right now. All it takes is for each of us, individually, to have the will to do so.

Animal foods (including meat, fish, dairy, eggs, etc.) are unnecessary for our health, and producing animal foods at scale is causing immense environmental devastation both on land and in the seas.
